4. Notice of Expiration of Authority Member Pierce's Term and Appointment of Representative for the Term February 1, 2016 through January 31, 2018. Currently Ron Leone and Loella Haskew serve as alternates for Director Pierce and Director Durant, and may serve as an alternate for either or both, as necessary. The alternate(s) must also be reappointed or replaced.

Director Leone recognized the value that Director Pierce had brought as TRANSPAC's representative to the Contra Costa Transportation Authority (CCTA) for 23 years, acknowledged the advantage of her positions on the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) which had brought influence to the region, and supported her reappointment to another two-year term, although he also spoke to the irony that Director Pierce represented the smallest jurisdiction in the region while Concord, the City with the largest population, had no representation on the CCTA. He added that the development of the Concord Naval Weapons Station (CNWS) would significantly increase Concord's current population. As a result, he asked that an item be placed on the next meeting agenda to consider a way to allow TRANSPAC's CCTA representation to rotate in the future.

Director Ross seconded the support for Director Pierce and agreed that in the future there had to be a rotation or limit to the term, while recognizing the value the experience of representatives offered in the long term. After the completion of the two-year term, he supported some rotation.

It was clarified that the vote would be by electeds only.

7. 511 Contra Costa Reports

A. Announcement

Lynn Overcashier, Program Manager, 511 Contra Costa, announced her retirement effective December 16, 2015 after 23 years with the organization. She expressed her joy at being able to work with many wonderful and talented colleagues over those years with the development of the Transportation Demand Management (TDM) program, including employer-based trip reduction, Street Smarts programs, electric vehicle infrastructure, bicycle infrastructure, transit and college programs, and community promotions. She advised that she would be leaving the department in very capable hands with Corinne Dutra-Roberts who had 18 years' experience with the department. She also reported that 511 had just received word that the City of Pleasant Hill had arranged the continuation of 511's insurance with the Municipal Pooling Authority and would be covered through the end of the fiscal year.

Director Leone thanked Lynn for her service and commented that when she saw problems she fixed those problems, and added beneficial programs.

Director Pierce expressed her appreciation for Lynn's long tenure and expertise.

Ray Kuzbari thanked Lynn for her great contributions to TRANSPAC and 511 Contra Costa, and for her behind-the-scenes work with the schools in Concord. He noted that she was very popular with the School District, the principals, and the City of Concord. She had done a great job and would be sorely missed.

John Cunningham congratulated Lynn on her retirement and commended her for the consistent level of assistance she had provided to both staff and elected officials for TRANSPAC and TRANSPLAN. He added that her work was consistently welcomed. He was sorry to see her go.

Chair Haskew agreed and acknowledged Lynn's passion for the work and the impressive job she had done.

At this time, it was noted that Director Mitchoff would not be able to attend the meeting.

The TAC discussed the item at its meeting on September 24, 2015 and recommended the retention of the status quo for a year to allow the TRANSPAC Board a sense of what to budget. (Continued from the October 8, 2015 TRANSPAC agenda.)

9. TRANSPAC CCTA Representative Reports: Reports on the October CCTA Administration and Projects Committee (Member Pierce), Planning Committee (Member Durant), and the CCTA Board meeting (Members Pierce and Durant).

Director Pierce reported that the Planning Committee had been cancelled this month. For the Administration and Projects Committee, she described the routine items on the agenda, stated that projects were moving along, among them State Route 4 which had three action items; an update on the SR4 East Widening Project from Somersville Road to I-680, the eBART project moving along with it, and an extended contract with Contra Costa County for Right-of-Way (ROW) services, along with an amended contract with T.Y. Lin to provide additional planning and ROW engineering services.

10. CCTA Executive Director's Report Regarding Authority Actions/Discussion Items

CCTA Executive Director Randell H. Iwasaki's Report dated October 21, 2015 had been included in the Board packet.

11. Items Approved by the Authority for Circulation to the Regional Transportation Planning Committees (RTPCs) and Related Items of Interest

The letter to RTPCs from Randell H. Iwasaki dated September 18, 2015 for the September 16, 2015 Board Meeting had been included in the Board packet.

12. TAC Oral Reports by Jurisdiction

Eric Hu reported that the City of Pleasant Hill/City of Walnut Creek joint Geary Road project was in the final planning and landscape phase with a ribbon cutting scheduled for November 30, 2015 at 3:30 P.M. at the Fire Station on the north side of Geary Road. TRANSPAC members were invited to attend the event.

Tim Tucker updated the status of the Intermodal project in Martinez where the next component was to build a vehicular bridge from Berrellesa Avenue to Alhambra Creek; and a pedestrian bridge upgrade and elevator for the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) component, and realigning the entrance off of Ferry Street. The bridge project had been bid separately, a protest to the award had delayed the process, and while the challenge had not prevailed it had postponed the work long enough to be unable to start prior to the winter. Kickoff was expected on May 1, 2016. The plans for the pedestrian bridge and realignment of the entrance off of Ferry Street were 100 percent complete and were still waiting for Railroad approval, although the hope was to get those issues resolved shortly and start both projects in the spring.

Jeremy Lochirco stated with respect to the Treat Boulevard/I-680 Overcrossing Study that it was being Transportation for Livable Communities (TLC) funded through the Measure J program. Work had started eighteen months ago, the draft report had been released earlier this year, and had come up with four options to conduct bike/ped improvements over the Treat Boulevard Bridge to link up with the BART station in Walnut Creek. It had later been determined that a fifth option would better integrate facilities across the bridge. The consultant would work on the fifth option and the draft would be released for public review and comment next month.

Director Pierce expressed concern for the length of the signal at the off-ramp on the east side of the freeway, and Mr. Lochirco explained that intersection was very sensitive with respect to traffic modeling since there was limited ROW across the bridge and they had to deal with operational components. He acknowledged that significant concerns had been expressed for the length of the signal and the whole area had a lot of queuing issues.

Director Pierce urged Mr. Lochirco to talk to Randy Iwasaki at the CCTA in that there might be some technology improvements that could be considered to address those concerns.

Director Leone advised that former Concord Mayor and TRANSPAC Chair Bill Shinn had passed away.

Director Pierce stated that Mr. Shinn had also been a former TRANSPAC representative to the CCTA, which had adjourned its last meeting in his memory.

Randell H. Iwasaki, Executive Director At its May 2015 meeting, the Contra Costa Transportation Authority initiated the update to the 2013 Measure J *Strategic Plan*. Every two years, the Authority reviews its assumptions on future Measure J revenues, debt service costs, and projected Measure J expenditures in order to respond to fluctuations in economic conditions and project schedules.

The outcome of the *Strategic Plan* is a firm commitment of Measure J funds by year to specific projects for the next 5-7 years. In addition, project sponsors will know the amount of Measure J funds programmed for their projects beyond the 5-7 year time horizon, but not the exact year for funding. With every update, an additional 2 years are added to the previous *Strategic Plan* time horizon providing the project sponsors more specificity on the funding years for their projects.

Programming Capacity

The approved revenue forecast for the 2015 Strategic Plan shows a slight increase in revenues over the life of Measure J (\$4 million for projects). Given the large size of the Authority's current construction program, the Authority instructed staff to augment the programmed construction reserve by a total of \$4 million for unforeseen cost increases, as follows: \$1.94M (east), \$1.18M (central), \$0.52M (southwest), and \$0.36M (west). Therefore, at this time, no additional programming capacity beyond the \$4 million is projected in the 2015 Strategic Plan.

2999 Oak Road Suite 100 Walnut Creek CA 94597 PHONE: 925.256.4700 FAX: 925.256.4701 www.ccta.net It is estimated that \$27 million in cashflow capacity will be available in the last two years of the 2015 *Strategic Plan* time horizon (FY2019-20 and FY2020-21). Table 1 shows the break-down of this capacity by sub-region, while adhering to each sub-region's proportional share of Capital Project Categories in Measure J Expenditure Plan which takes into consideration previously programmed Measure J funds in each subregion.

Attachments 1 through 4 highlight projects with funding currently programmed outside the current time horizon for the 2013 Measure J Strategic Plan (FY2019-20 through FY2033-34). Measure J funds programmed for those projects may be advanced in the 2015 *Strategic Plan* subject to the limitation of cashflow capacity by sub-region.

Since there isn't enough cashflow capacity within the *Strategic Plan* time horizon for all programmed Measure J projects, priority should be assigned to on-going projects with cost increases and projects that are ready to proceed.

Below is a summary of funding issues on ongoing Measure J projects.

a) Requests to Increase Measure J Programmed Funds: Since there is no additional programming capacity in the 2015 Strategic Plan, increasing Measure J programmed funds on these projects will require reducing funding on other projects within the same subregion(s).

State Route 4/Balfour Road Interchange: Construction is expected to start in 2016 but there is currently a funding shortfall of \$17 million. ECCRFFA and Measure J funds are needed to bridge this funding gap.

To keep the project on schedule, staff proposes to program \$6 million from "East County Corridor Reserve" to the project. ECCRFFA will be requested to fund the remaining \$11 million.

State Route 4 Integrated Corridor Mobility (ICM): The Authority has received \$200,000 grant to develop the scope for the SR4 ICM project. In addition, the Authority will be competing for another \$6 million in federal grants for the project. A local match of \$4 million is needed.

In order to provide the match for the grant, staff proposes programming \$4 million from Central and East County shares (\$2 million each) in the 2015 *Strategic Plan*. In East County,

it is proposed to program funds from the "Subregional Needs" category for this project. In Central County, it is more challenging since the "Subregional Needs" category is fully programmed and the project is eligible under one other category (Interchange Improvements on I-680 and SR242) in the expenditure plan. One option would be to reprogram \$2 million from the SR242/Clayton Road, as the project is not likely to be constructed prior to FY2020-21 given its funding shortfall.

b) Requests to Advance the Programming Year for Measure J funds: Advancing programmed Measure J funds will not require reducing funding on other projects but will impact Measure J cashflow capacity.

<u>Caldecott Tunnel:</u> Changes introduced by the State Fire Marshall, other design changes and differing site conditions are the basis for "claims" submitted by the contractor. Caltrans and the contactor are continuing to resolve the final cost of the tunnel contract. It is possible that additional project reserves will have to be expended. Measure J commitments at this time are approximately \$129.8 million which includes \$5.4 million commitment to backfill RM2 funds reprogrammed by MTC to the I-680 Carpool Lane Completion project in anticipation of construction savings. Currently \$125 million is programmed in the 2013 *Strategic Plan*, potentially requiring another \$4.8 million to be reserved for the project until the final cost is resolved.

In order to ensure sufficient funding is available to address the final cost of the project, staff proposes maintaining the existing and additional construction reserves in Southwest and Central counties for the project. This will require advancing the programming year for the reserves to FY2019-20 or earlier, thereby reducing the cashflow capacity for Central and Southwest counties by \$3 million and \$1.8 million, respectively. A strategic plan amendment will be completed in the future to reprogram the funds from the reserves to the Caldecott tunnel if needed.

<u>I-680 Southbound Carpool Lane Completion:</u> In December 2013, the Authority and TRANSPAC approved reprogramming up to \$4.9 million for the I-680 SB Carpool Lane Completion project from the I-680 Corridor Reserve. The final amount to be reprogrammed was to be determined after settling all claims on the Caldecott tunnel. Assuming there will be no savings on the Caldecott Tunnel, \$4.9 million will need to be programmed in the 2015 *Strategic Plan* to the I-680 Carpool Lane Completion project.

In order to keep the I-680 Carpool Lane Completion project on schedule, staff proposes advancing the programming year for the \$4.9 million to FY2019-20 or earlier.

<u>I-680/State Route 4:</u> The I-680/SR-4 (phase 3) project, which will widen State Route 4 in the vicinity of I-680, has currently a funding shortfall of \$38 million. The shortfall is due to the need to replace (in lieu of widening as originally envisioned) a deteriorating state-owned bridge (Grayson Creek Bridge) within the project limits. Staff is actively working with Caltrans to add SHOPP funds to the project, and continuing to advance utility relocations and right-of-way work while considering possible phasing.

To reduce the funding shortfall, staff recommends moving all remaining Measure J funds programmed to the project from future years to FY2019-20 or earlier.

BART Del Norte Station: BART has requested moving an additional \$2.5 million programmed to the project from future years to FY2019-20 or earlier.

Richmond Parkway: The City of Richmond has requested moving all remaining Measure J funds programmed to the project of \$0.5 million from future years to FY2015-16.

c) Projects with Surplus Funding. At this time, it is anticipated that only one project to have surplus Measure J funding that can be reprogrammed to other projects in the same subregion. Surplus funds will help offset the demand on cashflow capacity in earlier years.

<u>Alhambra Creek Bridge and Ferry Street Improvements (Martinez)</u>: Project is currently under construction and is expected to have at least \$3.3 million in Measure J funds that can be programmed to other projects in the same category.

Table 2 summarizes the remaining cashflow capacity by sub-region based on staff recommendations above.

EXCERPT FROM THE TAC MINUTES OF THE SEPTEMBER 24, 2015 MEETING RE: THE FOLLOWING:

Discussion: Regional Transportation Planning Committee Structure. At the TRANSPAC Board meeting on September 10, 2015, the Board requested that the TAC examine different committee structures and provide feedback to the Board. This request was a result of the dialogue regarding the transitional phase of the Committee after the departure of the TRANSPAC Manager and other organizational changes.

Mr. Cunningham presented his evaluation in table form of the various committee models in use in Contra Costa County to start the discussion directed by the TRANSPAC Board that the TAC examine different committee structures and provide feedback to the Committee given the transitional phase of the Committee after the departure of the TRANSPAC Manager and other organizational changes.

Mr. Kuzbari suggested that the TAC could be kept running smoothly with the status quo for the next couple of years, with everyone doing their part to see how it worked.

Mr. Hu noted that was one of the options. He thanked Mr. Cunningham for compiling the information for the discussion.

Ms. Overcashier suggested that one other advantage of keeping things status quo was that it would mean return to source funds would remain with the jurisdiction because an Executive Director would not need to be supported.

The effect of the legal costs on the budget given the ongoing Joint Powers Authority (JPA) process was raised and discussed.

Ms. Dutra-Roberts also suggested operating as is for now to see what would need to be done.

Mr. Lochirco wanted it clarified that it needed to be very clearly stated that there would be implications to existing city staff in each jurisdiction since that would directly affect the staff workload. He stated that the electeds needed to know that if their staff was working on something that had previously been handled by someone else, they would be authorizing a change in paradigm. He assumed even continuing at status quo there would need to be a chair or vice chair or something so that it was not a constant revolving door of who was leading the meeting.

Mr. Kuzbari noted at the TAC level it was just the person running the meeting. At the TRANSPAC level, Ms. Neustadter had introduced every single item and told the members what was going on. Currently, he suggested that was not needed in that if there was an item, each person would speak to it.

Mr. Kuzbari suggested the effort level was not that much and did not want to go near saying that it would take too much of their time and did not want to be reimbursed for cost, because he didn't think they were there.

Mr. Lochirco reiterated that the potential for extra work for staff should be clearly articulated and while the process had previously been seamless, it was slightly different now. He suggested that needed to be reported.

Mr. Cunningham noted the assumption that volunteering and jumping into the items would be a short-term solution. He suggested continuing the status quo for a year to figure out how it was working, and beyond that he agreed the electeds needed to know there was a bit more staff level involvement, even if just a marginal increase.

Ms. Overcashier explained that for Line 20a, for instance, staff had kept a running spreadsheet as opposed to Ms. Neustadter, and stated the responsibility was more evident for a TAC member to follow through given the lack of a safety net. She suggested a letter to TRANSPAC jurisdictions could advise of that change.

Mr. Lochirco agreed with a letter to advise and continued to seek recognition of the potential to increase staff time dedicated to TRANSPAC.

Mr. Kuzbari stated that the process had worked for over a year and everyone had done their part harmoniously. He recommended keeping the operation status quo through 2016.

On the discussion, the TAC agreed to retain the status quo for a year which would give the TRANSPAC Board a sense of what to budget.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT November 18, 2015

Construction Managers Association of America (CMAA) National Conference: October 11-13, 2015

Ivan Ramirez, the Authority's Construction Manager, attended the CMAA National Conference and Trade Show in Orlando, Florida. Ivan was able to network, discuss our construction program with construction management professionals and learn of the issues changing the construction industry such as the use of alternative delivery methods, the use of technology in construction and the aging of the work force. Ivan also represented the Authority in accepting the 2015 Construction Management Project Achievement Award for projects under \$50M for the Sand Creek Interchange & 4-Lane Widening Project. Expenses for the trip totaled \$1,750.09.

Contra Costa Economic Partnership: October 19, 2015

We hosted the CCEP board meeting. I gave the board members an update on the progress of testing at the GoMentum Station and recent announcement regarding our exclusive agreement with EasyMile. EasyMile will be tested at the GoMentum Station and rolled out at Bishop Ranch.

Walnut Creek Rotary Club Presentation: October 20, 2015

I gave the Redefining Mobility/City 5.0 presentation and a construction program update to the Walnut Creek Rotary Club. The members were interested in the various projects that were underway in their region. They asked a number of questions about the future of transportation.

California Transportation Commission: October 21, 2015

I was asked to be one of the three speakers welcoming the CTC commissioners and staff to the Bay Area. My topic was autonomous vehicles. After my speech, I was asked by CTC Commissioner Fran Inman to provide a National Freight Advisory Committee update. The first draft National Strategic Freight Plan had been released by US DOT Secretary Foxx for comments so I could discuss various aspects of the plan. The next meeting of the NFAC will be held in Washington, DC on November 12 and 13. I am the Chair of the NFAC.

International Urban Freight Conference (I-NUF): October 22, 2015

I provided the keynote speech at the I-NUF conference in Long Beach. The topic was Taking Research to Deployment. I also provided an update on the National Strategic Freight Plan. The event was well attended and there were several questions.

I was asked to be a judge for the Associated General Contractors of California (AGC) annual awards program. There were a number of projects in various categories. Our Sand Creek project was a finalist for the partnering award, however the Fix 50 project won in that category. UC Berkeley: October 26, 2015

I worked with Tom West at UC Berkeley to set up a meeting with Assembly Member Jim Frazier and his staff to provide them with a great example of a transportation research program. We were treated to several presentations regarding Intelligent Transportation Research, Transportation Sustainability and their outreach programs.

East Bay Leadership Council (EBLC) - Legislative Representatives / Chamber of Commerce Executive Quarterly Meeting: October 27, 2015

Ross Chittenden was invited to speak at the EBLC event. Ross discussed the process and status of development of a possible Transportation Expenditure Plan (TEP). The group included Kristen Connelly who serves on the Authority's Expenditure Plan Advisory Committee (EPAC) and other individuals who were involved in Alameda's Measure BB in 2014. There is an interest in the group in participating as the TEP process moves forward.

American Council of Engineering Consultants (ACEC): October 28, 2015

Ross Chittenden was invited to speak at the ACEC Bay Bridge Chapter luncheon event regarding technology and plans for development of a possible TEP. ACEC membership includes most of the engineering and construction management consultants who provide services to the Authority.

Long Term Pavement Performance Committee: October 28-29, 2015

I attended the LTPP committee meeting in Washington, DC. The committee was given an update on the Federal Highway Administration's changes at the top and the status of the three versions of a long term surface transportation bill. The goal of the program is to provide researchers, consultants, and academia access to pavement performance data from the test sites that were built many years ago. This data will help us design longer lasting pavements. We are working on finding ways to re-engage the State Department of Transportation officials. At the upcoming TRB annual meeting, the results of the ASCE Data Analysis contest will be announced. There are new LTPP experiments being conducted. Test sites are being built around the nation to start gathering data for warm mix asphalt overlays. This mix design doesn't require the high temperatures needed for conventional asphalt concrete mixes. We want to start gathering durability data. The other LTPP experiment is for pavement preservation. This is important information to help designers select the right treatment for pavements to further their service life.

American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) Video: October 29, 2015

According to the Gartner Group, by 2020 there will be 250 million connected vehicles on the road. ASCE asked me to answer several questions about the differences and benefits of connected and autonomous vehicle technologies. The interviewer was Casey Dinges, Senior Managing Director, Public Affairs, Membership, Leadership & Programs from ASCE. The interview will be available on ASCE's website in the future.

Intelligent Transportation Society of California (ITS-CA) meeting: October 29, 2015 Hisham Noeimi was one of four speakers who presented to ITS-CA luncheon meeting. His presentation was on the I-80 Integrated Corridor Mobility (ICM) project, which is slated to be activated in Spring 2016. Jack Hall moderated the meeting.

Patrick Hoge - SF Business Times: November 2, 2015

I discussed the status of the GoMentum Station Program. Patrick wants to talk to our partners about the testing program. He is working on an update to the original story he wrote after our initial "Redefining Mobility" Summit, which was held in Concord California earlier this year.

ACEC California Engineering Awards: November 3, 2015

I was a judge for the ACEC's engineering awards. There were over 30 submittals for their award levels. The judges represented various engineering disciplines. The award winners will be announced at the ACEC awards banquet in San Diego on January 28, 2015.

Electric Vehicle (EV) Charging Station Innovation: November 4, 2015

Peter Engel and I met with Joe Sbranti, Pittsburg City Manager, Peter Guadagni, Island Energy General Manager, and Cal Silcox, PG&E Education and Outreach Coordinator for EV and Electrification. The plan is to develop a first of its kind streamlined permitting process for buyers of EVs. When a customer buys an EV, they will be handed a package. The package will contain a city permit application, list of PG&E approved electricians (within the vicinity of the purchaser), outlets for Type 2 EV charging stations, DMV sticker program, PG&E rate schedule, and a PG&E inspection of the wiring from the power pole to the home. Mr. Silcox reported after the meeting that Contra Costa had over 5,000 EV registered which makes it one of the highest adoption rates in California.

Staff Out-of-State Travel - Prior Reporting Period

As reported in October, I attended the International Highway Engineering Exchange Program (IHEEP) in Pittsburgh, PA. Expenses for the trip totaled \$54.11.

At its November 18, 2015 meeting, the Authority discussed the following report which may be of interest to the Regional Transportation Planning Committees:

Randell H. Iwasaki. **Executive Director**

1. Development of a Potential Transportation Expenditure Plan (TEP). Update on Stakeholder Input from the Regional Transportation Planning Committee (RTPCs), the Expenditure Plan Advisory Committee (EPAC), and Public Engagement Program. Authority staff and its consultant team have conducted a number of activities to develop a TEP for a possible revenue measure to be considered for placement on the ballot in November 2016 or a later general election. The development of a TEP for a possible new revenue measure is being conducted concurrent with the update of the Countywide Transportation Plan (CTP). Authority staff has sought input on a TEP from RTPCs, EPAC, the general public, and other stakeholders. Staff is providing an update on stakeholder input received to date, and considerations and recommendations as the Authority continues its efforts to update the CTP and develop a possible TEP. Based on Authority discussion, staff will be working with the RTPCs, other stakeholders and the EPAC, and will seek direction in December on specific policy issues, request the Authority to approve the decoupling of the CTP and TEP, and make a decision about its role in the TEP process going forward.

This correspondence reports on the actions and discussions during the TRANSPLAN Committee meeting on November 12, 2015.

AUTHORIZE 2013 Measure J Strategic Plan Amendment. The TRANSPLAN Committee ("Committee") upheld the TAC's recommendation unanimously approving a motion to authorize an amendment to the 2013 Measure J Strategic Plan to utilize \$200,000 as matching funds from the East County Subregional Needs fund for the State Route 4 Integrated Corridor Management concepts study. The Committee also directed CCTA staff to include language in the scope of work that would study bike and pedestrian improvements within the study corridor.

APPROVE the list of projects and proposed programming for the projected Measure J funding capacity through FY2034, as recommended by the TRANSPLAN Technical Advisory Committee, and DIRECT staff to forward the project list and programming plan to the CCTA. The Committee unanimously upheld the TAC's recommendation approving the project list.

The next regularly scheduled TRANSPLAN Committee meeting will be on Thursday, December 10, 2015 at 6:30 p.m. at the Tri Delta Transit offices in Antioch.
