#### 1. Convene Regular Meeting / Pledge of Allegiance / Self-Introductions

Chair Obringer called the meeting to order at 9:00 A.M. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

#### 2. Public Comment

There were no comments from the public.

#### 3. Consent Agenda

On motion by Commissioner Carlson, seconded by Commissioner Wilk, to approve the consent agenda by unanimous vote of the members present (Young, Enea, Obringer, Wilk, Carlson).

#### **End Consent Agenda**

#### 4. Transportation Fund For Clean Air (TFCA) Fund -- Fiscal Year 2025/2026 Call for Projects

Tiffany Gephart provided an update on the TFCA program. The call for projects was released May 29, 2025, with draft applications due June 18. Final project submissions are due July 18. The program operates through a two-tier process, with CCTA staff first collaborating with subregions to determine county-wide programs, then distributing remaining funds among subregions using the jobs-housing formula.

Ms. Gephart reviewed the programs funded in fiscal year 2024-25 and those proposed for 2025-26, noting that most programs continued from the previous year. County-wide programs include 511 Contra Costa maintenance, \$511 Big Win on Transit, TDM incentives, Guaranteed Ride Home, and Vanpool incentives. TRANSPAC-specific programs include the Walk 'n' Roll program and the Walnut Creek bikeway project (which was a capital project and will not continue).

Commissioner Obringer asked about schools participating in the expanded walk and roll program. Laurie Talbet noted that current participating schools include Pleasant Hill Elementary, Strandwood, Gregory Gardens, John Muir Elementary, Meadow Homes, Silverwood, and Morello Park, with Valhalla and Mount Diablo Elementary signed for fall enrollment.

#### 5. Measure J Line 21A Program

Matt Todd provided an update on efforts to implement a pilot program providing free bus fares for students. He outlined three programs: County Connection's current summer youth program (free rides for ages 18 and under through July), the traditional pass to class program (TFCA-funded, requiring applications), and the proposed new pilot program.

Pranjal Dixit reported significant ridership increases from County Connection's summer youth program. Compared to last year's 630 total youth rides, the current free program generated 11,889 trips in June alone. TRANSPAC area ridership increased from 500 to 9,700 trips. Similar increases occurred with Tri Delta Transit and WestCAT.

Mr. Todd reported that SWAT discussed the program at their July 8 meeting, expressing interest in continuing a program like the Summer Youth Program, rather than transitioning to Pass to Class. However, CCTA staff determined that modifying the TFCA-funded Pass to Class Program would not meet air district requirements for cost-effectiveness, and introducing the new component could jeopardize future funding.

Mr. Todd recommended considering another scenario that would implement the free youth program from January through June, which would avoid disrupting TFCA commitments while achieving program goals. This approach would require continued coordination between TRANSPAC, SWAT and CCTA.

Commissioner Carlson noted potential ARPA funding opportunities through county district allocations that could support the program expansion.

#### 6. Contra Costa Transportation Authority Integrated Transit Plan

Danielle Elkins introduced the item, noting this was the final RTPC presentation seeking feedback on transit priority corridors and other plan elements.

Kevin Connolly and Adam Dankberg presented the Integrated Transit Plan (ITP), a transit-first vision for coordinated bus service throughout Contra Costa County focusing on intra-county travel. The plan includes transit priority corridors (TPCs), frequent bus networks, micro transit, mobility hubs, and active transportation integration.

The proposed TPCs in the TRANSPAC area were outlined:

- TPC 2: Martinez Amtrak to Dublin/Pleasanton BART via I-680 (reflecting ongoing CCTA projects)
- TPC 5: Pleasant Hill BART to Concord BART via Treat Boulevard and Clayton Road (candidate for transit lanes on full length)
- TPC 6: Walnut Creek BART to Pittsburg BART with potential marina extension (candidate transit lanes on Ygnacio Valley Road portions)
- TPC 7: Clayton to Martinez via Clayton Road, Concord BART, Willow Pass, and DVC
- TPC 8: Walnut Creek BART to Concord BART

Commissioner Enea questioned the feasibility of transit lanes on Railroad Avenue in Pittsburg, noting minimal ridership and infrastructure constraints. Commissioner Wilk expressed concerns about removing lanes on Ygnacio Valley Road, citing severe congestion impacts from any lane closures.

Chair Obringer asked about ridership projections and policy impacts from state legislation (SB 79) that could trigger additional housing requirements near full Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) implementations.

Ms. Elkins clarified that only full BRT buildouts with dedicated bus-only lanes would potentially trigger SB 79 housing provisions, and this would apply only to limited corridor sections.

The presenters emphasized this is a 20-year planning horizon and that detailed traffic analysis, design feasibility, and stakeholder engagement have not yet occurred.

#### 7. TRANSPAC CCTA Representative Reports

No reports were provided as CCTA meetings were scheduled for later the same day due to the July 4th holiday.

#### 8. Metropolitan Transportation Commission Report

No report was provided as Commissioner Noack was absent.

#### 9. TAC Oral Reports by Jurisdiction

No reports were provided.

#### 10. Board Member Comments

No comments were provided.

#### 11. Managing Director's Report

Mr. Todd announced that CCTA received a \$58 million Trade Corridor Enhancement Program award for I-680/Highway 4 interchange improvements. He noted the funds would support several phases of the multi-phase project.

Mr. Todd confirmed there would be no August board meeting. There was discussion regarding the September 11 meeting date and that it might need adjustment due to September 11th memorial events in multiple jurisdictions.

#### 12. Adjourn / Next Meeting

The meeting adjourned at approximately 10:44 a.m. The next regular meeting is scheduled for September 11, 2025, at 9:00 a.m. at Pleasant Hill City Hall Large Community Room, 100 Gregory Lane, Pleasant Hill, with remote teleconference options for public participation. ## EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT July 16, 2025

#### Meeting with United States (US) Steel: June 25, 2025

Ryan McClain and I met with US Steel to discuss updates and the disposition of US Steel relative to the proposed acquisition of US Steel by Nippon Steel. We also discussed future steps and the process that will be undertaken for the proposed acquisition. We are tracking the acquisition process and the disposition of the US Steel property in Pittsburg, CA.

#### Meeting with Chambers of Commerce: June 27, 2025

Danielle Elkins, Ryan McClain, and I attended a meeting convening the Chief Executive Officers of the Chambers of Commerce in Contra Costa County. I was invited to speak about the Authority and our vision for the future.

#### Community Event Series – Richmond Juneteenth Festival: June 21, 2025

Authority staff and Commissioners Chris Kelley and Rita Xavier engaged with over 200 attendees at the City of Richmond's Juneteenth celebration in Nicholl Park, discussing topics such as Richmond Moves microtransit, accessible transportation, paratransit services, and coordination of countywide traffic signals. Attendees expressed interest in Measure J-funded projects, the Richmond Ferry, and Autonomous Vehicle technology. Staff received valuable feedback on service gaps and transit access across city lines, while also gathering email signups and sharing information tailored to City of Richmond communities.

#### Shared Autonomous Vehicle Monthly Ridership – June 2025

#### **Bishop Ranch Ridership**

Bishop Ranch Ridership in the month of June 2025 was 81, which is a 19% increase from May's 68 riders. The out-of-service total reported hours was 1.5 hours. Beep's service contract expires at the end of July 2025.

#### **Rossmoor Ridership**

Rossmoor Ridership in June 2025 was 108, nearly equal to May's 114 riders. There were a few hours-of-service disruptions due to technical and software issues.

#### **Martinez Ridership**

May Mobility's ridership is still low, with 81 riders reported for the month of June 2025. The total riders from start of service, September 12, 2024, are 311 riders, with 82% repeat riders, an average party size of 1.15 people, an average wait time of 5.1 minutes, with 100% early or on-time pickups. 110 riders rated the ride 5.0 stars. The Authority is engaging in marketing activities at Kaiser to increase ridership.

#### Website Update - June 2025

Open job opportunities drove a slight increase in web traffic in June 2025. The website saw 4,500 users. Many of these users were directed through the site via organic social – likely also connected to the open job postings.

- LinkedIn platform added 73 new followers (+30.4%), reaching 2,207 total followers its best growth month in 2025.
- Facebook impressions remained high from posting community-driven content around Pride,
  Juneteenth, and infrastructure updates like promoting the Iron Horse Trail Bicycle and
  Pedestrian Overcrossing at Bollinger Canyon Ribbon Cutting on July 19, 2025. We anticipate
  a large advertising spend on Meta platforms in late July or early August as digital media
  promotion tactics for the second Countywide Transportation Plan survey should boost
  engagement numbers via those promoted posts.
- X posted only once, but the content remained impactful, with over 100 engagements on a transit alert tweet, affirming X's role as a quick-hit update platform.
- Next Door was only used twice but generated the most community comments and engagements of any platform.

The TRANSPLAN Committee undertook the following activities during its meeting on June 12, 2025:

- 1. Received a presentation on the Integrated Transit Plan from Contra Costa Transportation Authority staff. Members of the Committee commented that Lone Tree Way should be considered for transit priority corridor (TPC) improvements and that potential TPC improvements on Railroad Avenue in Pittsburg that involve converting general purpose lanes to transit-only lanes would present challenges to existing travelers on the roadway.
- 2. Received a presentation on Tri Delta Transit's Comprehensive Operational Analysis from Tri Delta Transit staff. Members of the Committee inquired about the differences between potentially operating hydrogen or electric buses versus diesel buses. Members also inquired about the performance of the Tri MyRide service.

The Southwest Area Transportation Committee ("SWAT") met Monday, July 7, 2025. The following is a summary of the meeting and action items:

- 1. Approved the SWAT SWAT TDM Budget FY 20225/2026: and
- 2. Vice Chair Andersen led a conversation on the Summer Youth Ride Free Pass. County Connection reported substantial increases in youth ridership in the SWAT and TRANSPAC regions since the Youth Ride Free started in June. Vice Chair Andersen then requested that SWAT partially fund a continuation of the Youth Ride Free pass, with additional funds provided by Supervisor Andersen's discretionary County Livable Communities Fund, to cover an additional four months of the pilot Youth Ride Free for County Connection rather than starting Pass2Class in August in the SWAT region. They then passed the following resolution:
  - a. Board member Hillis moved, and Board member Stepper seconded, that the SWAT BOD supports Vice Chair Andersen's request to continue to pursue creative solutions to keep the pilot Youth Ride Free County Connection bus pass program going in SWAT through the end of 2025; and secondarily request that SWAT staff ask for the answer to the following question:
    - i. Can there be a delay in the Pass2Class 2025 program TFCA funding until January 1, 2026 when SWAT and Supervisor Andersen's Office provide funds for an extension of Youth Ride Free through December 2025?

Summary of Issues	The Transportation Fund for Clean Air (TFCA) program funds projects that promote alternatives to single-occupancy vehicles and result in reduced air pollution from motor vehicles. CCTA released the TFCA FY 2025-26 call for projects on May 29, 2025, with final applications due July 18, 2025. For FY 2025-26, there is \$1,891,105 available in TFCA funds.
	At the July TRANSPAC Board and August TAC meetings, staff presented the performance results from the FY 2024-25 Countywide and Subregional programs and outlined the proposed continuation and expansion of the Walk 'n' Roll program for FY 2025-26. CCTA recommends allocating \$248,294 to the Walk 'n' Roll program for FY 2025-26 (approximately 30% of the total available subregional TFCA funding).
Recommendations	Approve the programming of \$248,294 in TFCA subregional funds to support the Walk 'n' Roll (TRANSPAC) school trip reduction program for FY 2025-26.
Options	Propose an alternative funding strategy.
Financial Implications	TRANSPAC is responsible for recommendations on how the TFCA funds are used in the TRANSPAC subregion. The programming resulting from the above process will commit TFCA revenue to eligible projects. Any program that is ultimately approved will be funded with CCTA TFCA revenue.

Rackground	

#### **Background**

The Transportation Fund for Clean Air (TFCA) program funds projects that reduce air pollution from motor vehicles and relieve traffic congestion. The program is funded by a \$4 surcharge on Bay Area vehicle registrations administered by the Bay Area Air Quality Management District. CCTA serves as the Administering Agency for Contra Costa County and allocates funds using a

two-tier process established in the CCTA TFCA Policy: countywide programs that benefit all residents, and subregional programs that benefit specific geographic areas.

For FY 2025-26, there is \$1,891,105 available in TFCA funds.

#### Countywide Programs Available to TRANSPAC Residents (\$1,063,115):

- 511 Contra Costa Brand + TDM Programs (\$773,237) Website, marketing, yearround Big Win on Transit incentives, and seasonal campaigns
- Countywide Vanpool Program (\$229,878) 3-month startup incentives for new Vanpools
- Guaranteed Ride Home (\$60,000) Emergency ride reimbursement for alternative commuters

After funding these countywide programs, the remaining \$827,990 is distributed to subregional projects. Central County receives \$248,294 (approximately 30% of subregional funds) based on the jobs/housing formula.

#### Walk 'n' Roll Program Continuation

The Walk 'n' Roll program, managed by 511 Contra Costa, encourages elementary school students to bike, walk, and carpool to school through incentive prizes and engagement activities. The FY 2024-25 program exceeded expectations, enrolling 2,816 students across seven Central County elementary schools.

For FY 2025-26, the program proposes to:

- Continue supporting the existing 7 participating schools
- Expand to 10 additional schools for a total of 17 schools
- Continue community engagement and employer outreach activities
- Meet TFCA cost-effectiveness requirements for emission reductions for trip reduction projects.

#### **Next Steps**

Following TRANSPAC Board approval, CCTA will present the complete countywide and subregional project recommendations to the CCTA Board in October 2025. Upon CCTA Board approval, project implementation may begin, with funding agreements executed between CCTA and project sponsors.

Summary of Issues	The Contra Costa Transportation Authority (CCTA) is updating the Measure J Strategic Plan to reflect current revenue projections and project delivery timelines for the next 5-7 years. The Strategic Plan establishes funding commitments and timing for specific Measure J projects and is updated every 2-3 years to assess revenue growth, debt service costs, and other factors. At this meeting, CCTA staff will present highlights from the 2025 Strategic Plan update, including revenue forecasts, programmatic reserves, and remaining project schedules for each subregion.

#### **Background**

Measure J is Contra Costa County's half-cent transportation sales tax, approved by voters in November 2004 to extend the measure for 25 years (April 1, 2009, through March 31, 2034). The Measure J Expenditure Plan allocates funding between specific capital projects (\$812 million) and ongoing programs (\$1.088 billion).

The Measure J Strategic Plan serves as a financial roadmap that anticipates funding needs and availability for the next 5-7 years, establishes timing and size of bond issuances, and commits funding to specific projects in particular years. The Strategic Plan is updated every 2-3 years to reassess assumptions regarding revenue growth, debt service costs, and project delivery schedules.

The 2025 Strategic Plan update reflects several significant developments since the 2022 plan:

**Revenue Performance:** Actual Measure J revenues have significantly exceeded projections from the 2022 Strategic Plan, with \$48.35 million (15.25%) more collected over the past three years than originally forecasted. The updated revenue forecast projects three scenarios through 2034, with the baseline scenario showing \$60 million more than the 2022 projections.

**Financial Improvements:** CCTA completed refinancing of 2015 bonds in early 2025, reducing interest costs by \$7 million. Additionally, the agency secured significant external funding, including \$166 million in Federal Mega Funds for Innovate 680 and \$58 million in SB1 Funds for I-680/SR4.

**Project Delivery:** Several major Measure J projects are expected to begin construction in the next three years, with construction capital costs exceeding \$600 million. To address potential cost increases and revenue fluctuations, CCTA is establishing programmatic construction reserves in each subregion.

**Program Capacity:** Due to improved cashflow capacity from higher-than-projected revenues, CCTA has removed the hold on programming the next cycle of Transportation for Livable Communities (TLC) and Pedestrian, Bicycle, and Trail Facilities (PBTF) Measure J funds in 2025.

#### **Next Steps**

The proposed schedule for completing the 2025 Strategic Plan includes:

- July September 2025: Regional Transportation Planning Committee (RTPC) input
- November 2025: Draft 2025 Measure J Strategic Plan
- December 2025: Final 2025 Measure J Strategic Plan

The TRANSPAC Board is requested to provide input on the Measure J Strategic Plan framework to ensure Central County priorities and concerns are appropriately addressed in the final Strategic Plan.

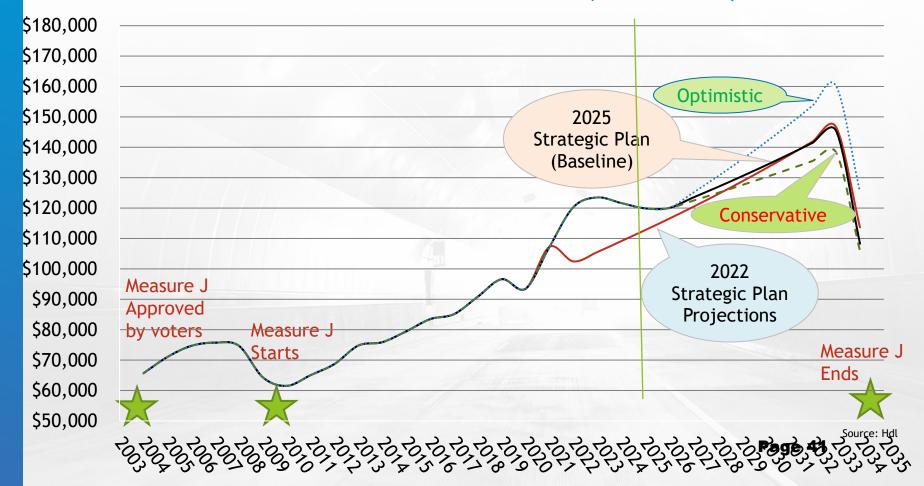

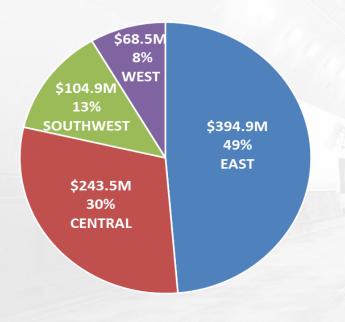

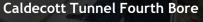
